
down again, and again, and again!






SPRING TERM IN YEAR1

"I like phonics because we are leaning new digraphs. I like Tricky Witch best because she is a wizard and makes the letters say different sounds". Sean


SPRING TERM IN YEAR 2








YEAR 2 TRIP TO THE SCIENCE MUSEUM










SCIENCE QUIZ CHAMPIONSHIP






MERTON LIVE & SINGFEST


amusing was the Easter Hat design, where some boys went overboard with their outrageous creations.



This was followed by a visit to the most popular, and new, area called Launchpad. This was an interactive area, which allowed exploration of light, materials, energy transfer, forces and motion, electricity, magnetism and sound. Launchpad succeeded in its aim of encouraging exploration, inquisitiveness and discussion. Year 7 visited London Zoo and made the most of their learning about animal classification and taxonomy of living organisms. We were impressed by their level of engagement and their polite behaviour and the workshop coordinator commented on how knowledgeable the boys were.

The grand finale of Science Week saw pupils and staff coming into school dressed either as a scientist, or a scientific concept.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR CLUBS

School life at Willington is further enriched with a wide array of clubs held before and after school, as well as at lunchtime. Ranging from judo and chess, art and sport scholarship through to orchestra and music theory, clubs are a great way for children to try something new. One of our most popular clubs with the younger children is yoga, run by Nicoletta Elek who explains a little more:

During our lunchtime sessions on Tuesdays and Thursdays, we practise breathing exercises, which help to generate concentration and calmness. These exercises are followed by yoga poses that create healthy body awareness by developing strength and flexibility in a non-competitive environment. In the second half of the class, the children learn about mindfulness, which helps them to focus.

The class is conducted in a playful manner, so that the children can remember and use these skills in their everyday lives. The aim in class is to create a nurturing and non-judgmental environment where the children can feel free to talk about their feelings and anything that is worrying them. Yoga provides different techniques to help the children to calm down when they are feeling upset or stressed. We also highlight the positive effects of being kind and respectful towards each other.


